



1. Traditional Foods and Confectioneries:

- Dates and Date Products: Local dates, date syrup, date paste, and stuffed dates, reflecting the rich date culture of the UAE.
- Traditional Sweets (Halwa & other): Handmade sweets using local ingredients like saffron, cardamom, and rosewater.
- **Rice (Raw Material):** Non-cooked rice bags, commonly used in Emirati households for preparing traditional rice-based dishes like Machbous and Biryani.
- Camel & Goat Milk products: Camel milk-based products, such as camel milk chocolates, cheese, and dairy items.
- Spices and Seasonings: Locally sourced spices, dried herbs, and traditional cooking ingredients specific to Emirati cuisine such as saffron, and cardamom.
- Medicinal local herbs & Plants: Traditional plants with healing properties used for medical purposes, such
 as sidr leaves, henna, and desert herbs, offered in their raw or processed form.
- Dried Meat (Gazelle and Other Halal Meats): Preserved and dried halal meats, including gazelle, prepared
 using traditional methods.
- Dried Locally sourced Seafood: Traditionally dried seafood varieties, often used in Emirati dishes or as
 preserved food.
- **Nuts:** A variety of nuts such as almonds, pistachios, cashews, and walnuts, often used in Emirati sweets, snacks, and cooking.
- Fresh local fresh & Dried Fruits: Locally grown and dried fruits, such as dates, and other traditional common types.
- Roasted Arabica Coffee Beans: High-quality Arabica coffee beans, roasted and used for traditional Arabic coffee (Gahwa).
- Pure Raw Honey: Raw honey sourced from local and regional beekeepers, valued for its purity and traditional use in UAE foods and remedies.
- Classic Packed Snacks: Candies, chocolate bars, small juice cartons, popsicle ice cream and potato chips commonly sold in local small grocery stores in the older neighborhoods of Dubai.
- Traditional Emirati Food: all type of authentic & traditional Emirati dishes such as;

Machbous**: Spiced rice dish typically made with chicken, lamb, or fish.

Biryani: Fragrant rice dish made with marinated meat and spices.

Harees: A dish made from wheat and meat, traditionally prepared during Ramadan.

Regag: A traditional thin bread, often served with various dishes.

Khameer: Type of Emirati thin & crispy bread, typically served warm, enjoyed with honey or cheese.

Chebab: A traditional Emirati pancake, often served with date syrup or sugar.





2. Traditional Household Goods:

Traditional Kitchenware and Utensils

- Clay and Copper Cookware: Handcrafted pots, pans, and kettles made from clay, copper, or brass, which have been traditionally used in Emirati households for cooking and serving.
- Palm Frond Baskets and Trays: Baskets and trays woven from palm fronds (Khos), used for serving or storage.
- Wooden Utensils: Hand-carved wooden spoons, ladles, cutting boards, and trays.
- Traditional Coffee Sets: Dallah (Arabian coffee pots) and cups used for serving Arabic coffee, along with traditional Arabica coffee beans.
- Clay or Copper Water Jugs: Traditional water storage vessels used for drinking and cooking. Textiles and Household Linens & Home Décor
- Handwoven Rugs and Carpets: Locally made rugs using traditional designs and materials, like wool and camel hair, reflecting the rich cultural heritage.
- Traditional Lanterns (Fanar): Metal or glass lanterns Oil or electric based, often used during cultural celebrations or as part of household décor.
- Wall Hangings: Classic locally common Mirrors tapestries or decorative pieces that feature Arabic calligraphy, Sadu weaving patterns, or images of Emirati landscapes.
- Ceramic Vases and Pots: Traditional ceramic pottery for home decoration or storage.
- Handwoven Cushions and Pillow Covers: Textiles featuring traditional Emirati designs such as Sadu patterns,
 ideal for household décor.
- Blankets and Bed Linens: Traditional embroidered or woven blankets and sheets made from natural fibers.
- **Table covers:** Handwoven or embroidered fabrics used as tabletop, featuring culturally significant patterns. Storage & Cleaning Solutions
- Palm Leaf Storage Baskets: Storage baskets made from woven palm fronds, which are durable and ecofriendly.
- Wooden Chests (Mandoos): Handcrafted wooden storage boxes or trunks, often adorned with intricate carvings or brass fittings.
- Handmade Brooms and Brushes: Made from natural materials like palm fronds or coconut fibers, used for household cleaning.

3. Traditional Crafts and Handicrafts:

- Sadu Weaving Products: Handwoven rugs, tapestries, and textiles made from camel hair or sheep wool.
- Khos (Palm Frond) Products: Handcrafted baskets, mats, fans, and decorative items woven from palm fronds.
- Talli Embroidery: Handwoven braids used to decorate traditional garments, especially abayas and kanduras.
- Khanjar (Traditional Daggers): Handcrafted silver or brass daggers, often intricately engraved, used as
 decorative items.





- Pottery: Handmade clay pots, jars, vases, and other pottery items using traditional techniques.
- Leather Goods: Locally made sandals, bags, belts, wallets, and accessories using camel or goat leather.
- Camel Milk Soap: Traditional soaps made from camel milk, known for their moisturizing properties.
- **Heritage related souvenirs:** Giftable items that is inspired from the local Emirati heritage or resembling traditional elements such as traditional buildings, cloths, decorative ornaments, animals... etc
- Traditional Beauty Products: Natural skincare and haircare products made from camel milk, henna, and local
 ingredients.

4. Traditional Clothing and Textiles:

- Emirati Ghutras, Agaal & Shaal: Handwoven traditional headdresses, reflecting traditional designs for men.
- Abaya: hand-sewn garments women outerwear cover.
- Kandora: Traditional daily outerwear clothing for men, often paired with accessories.
- Burqaa: The face cover worn by women, reflecting traditional values and cultural identity.
- **Emirati Jalabeya:** Local Emirati daily domestic wear for women, characterized by its comfortable and modest design.
- Emirati Makhawar: Another form of local Emirati daily wear for women, suitable for all ages.
- Emirati Thoub: Classic formal wear for women, typically worn on happy occasions such as weddings and celebrations.
- Traditional Footwear: Handcrafted sandals and slippers in traditional design for men and women.
- Textiles & Fabrics; Textile goods with traditional authentic Emirati designs and usages.
- Traditional Underwear's: Classic traditional underwear worn by men and women such as (Wezar) (Serwal)
- Emirati Bisht: Classic mens wear usually worn in happy occasions or official ceremonies.

5. Traditional Perfumes and Fragrances:

- Classic perfumes: Handcrafted perfume oils made from local and natural ingredients.
- Oud and Bakhoor: Locally sourced oud (agarwood) and Bakhoor (wood chips soaked in perfume oil) for traditional fragrance burning.
- Incense Burners (Mabkhara): Traditional incense burners used to burn Oud or Bakhoor, made from clay, wood, or metal, often intricately decorated.
- Incense burning kit (tools): Traditional hand-carved incense burners used for burning frankincense and
 other scents, often made from clay, wood, or metal, which comes with a kit of items used for incense
 burning, charcoal disks, stand, charcoal tong.





6. Artistic Goods:

- Arabic Calligraphy: Artworks featuring Traditional Arabic calligraphy, including framed artworks, written
 on parchment, canvas, or other materials.
- Hand carved Wooden Items: Decorative items like furniture, doors, and sculptures crafted from locally sourced wood, incorporating traditional Emirati designs and patterns.
- Traditional Musical Instruments: Emirati traditional musical instruments like Handmade ouds, tambourines, drums and other musical instruments native to the region.
- Paintings of Local Heritage: Artworks depicting Emirati landscapes, historical buildings, and traditional life
 or inspired by UAE's cultural heritage, desert landscapes, and architectural designs.
